
## Kootenai County Sheriff Office Patrol On Tribal Lands Timeline And

## Kootenai County Regional Air Support Timelines

- 5/12/22 Kootenai County Regional Air Support, Inc Non-Profit formed with the state of Idaho. KCSO LT Mark Ellis is listed as the registered agent and uses the KCSO address of 5500 N Government Way. This corporation is allegedly formed to purchase a private helicopter
- 2022- Unknown Date, CDA Tribe donates 200k towards the Helicopter
- 10/4/2022 KC BOCC minutes, Sheriff Norris and LT Ellis speak to the Commissioners about the KCRAS Corp and disclose the CDA Tribe's donation of 200k

   Starting at 45:50 mark concerning helicopter. BOCC directs Sheriff Norris to bring forth an official proposal/MOU to consider.
- 10/18/22 KC Prosecutor Stan Mortensen emails USAID Traci Whelan, KCSO LT Sifford and CDA Tribal Police Chief Weinclaw discussing how Tribal Police can patrol on KC in lieu of KCSO deputies.
- 10/18/22 KCSO LT Sifford email states that KCSO will be cross deputizing all Tribal Police and references a "flow chart"
- 12/8/22 CDA Tribal Counsel Van Orden emails KCSO LT Sifford stating that "Tribal leadership would prefer that the Tribal Police function as the primary law enforcement agency on the Reservation, whether the call involves a Tribal member or not".

   Starting at 18:22 KCSO Sheriff Norris and LT Ellis present to the BOC a Memo of Understanding (MOU) for Kootenai Regional Air Support and states Civil Asset Forfeiture funds(100k) will be used to purchase equipment and that the non-profit KCRAS liability insurance would cover operations. Also, FOIA is not applicable to private aircraft. BOCC approves the MOU and Asset Forfeiture funds of 100k from the County to the Non-Profit.

- 2023 Date unknown, KCSO discontinues routine patrol and responding to any call for service unless specifically requested by tribe
- Benewah County Sheriff Eells confirms that BCSO began getting dispatched to emergency calls in KC in the spring of 2023 due to KC not having any units to respond.



Hi Zach,

As the Chairman has said before, <u>Tribal leadership would prefer that the Tribal Police act as the primary law enforcement agency on the Reservation, whether the call involves a Tribal member or not.</u> Because the Tribal Officers are <u>cross deputized by Kootenai County they can handle all calls on the Reservation</u>. There may be times when Tribal Officers can't respond or need back up so in those cases the Tribal Police may call the County for assistance. I agree with the other points in your email. There likely won't be many occasions where a County deputy would exercise authority as a Tribal Officer, but it is good to have some training. I also agree that if the County is primary on a call then the County's standard operating procedures should be followed.

Sorry for not responding right away. I have reached out to a few people and am in the middle of doing some research. I have heard back from all but one person.

In the meantime, I want to offer a suggestion that might solve this problem. Idaho Code 19-5101 indicates that if tribal officers are both POST certified and cross-deputized by the Sheriff, then they are considered a peace officer under Idaho law. If tribal officers are both, then they can handle all calls for service involving both Indian and non-Indian persons. This way, KCSO doesn't need to respond. Tribal officers can respond, investigate, and, when necessary, make an arrest and file charges in state court. If the Sheriff is going to cross-deputize any tribal officer, I suggest he cross-deputizes all tribal officers. As you can imagine, it will be chaos if this is anything other than an all-or-nothing approach. Deputies on duty will have a hard time trying to determine whether or not to respond to the reservation depending on which tribal officers are on duty or on scene. Likewise, prosecutors will have a hard time handling cases when it is unclear whether or not the involved tribal officers are cross-deputized.

Without having to get too deep into this or go back-and-forth with a lot of hypothetical situations, can you advise me what the Sheriff's position is on cross-deputizing all of the tribal officers?

Good Morning,

We had a call the other night on the reservation that is a great example of the problems we are trying to correct, and need your input....

A call came into dispatch for a welfare check of a vehicle parked in the parking lot of the Casino gas station on the reservation. Casino Security was the reporting party and advised 3 people (Non-Tribal) in the vehicle one of which was holding a "crack pipe".

Tribal PD responded and was on scene for approximately 17 minutes before the County deputy arrived. Ultimately upon KCSO arrival, the Tribal officer had individuals detained and had located meth and it was sitting on the hood of the vehicle. Casino Security was also on scene and the deputy didn't determine the role they may or may not have had prior to his arrival.

## Good Morning,

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STAN- In previous experiences KCPAO had issues with KCSO taking primary in the middle of the call just like this based on chain of custody and articulation of what was found where and who was charged with what. This led to a K9 Deputy not wanting to take primary and left the tribal officer with the call. The tribal officer at the time is not cross deputized with KCSO.

Stan and Traci- If the tribal officer were to respond and determine the suspects were all non-tribal can he then detain and wait for KCSO to respond (17 minute response is probable a record, more of a 30-45 minute response is realistic). Will that be considered an extension of the stop to wait for KCSO to arrive and begin an investigation?

In this specific case the meth was seized by the tribal officer, however the suspect was not charged due to the Officer not being cross deputized.

Per our new "flow chart" and "agreement" this would be a call KCSO would handle primary on. The concerns are the potential detention issues.

We (KCSO) would like to bring these issues up as they arise and talk about them collectively so we can ensure we have the proper procedures in place to handle business. I have CC'd Capt. Wienclaw in this as well so he is in the loop. We
